New Look And Function For Blackboard

The next time you access your Blackboard Connect account to update your contact information or notification preferences, you will be greeted by an upgraded and redesigned platform that will prompt you to create a user ID and password.

The change is the result of the City recently shifting to Blackboard Connect's latest platform, which aims to afford users greater control and functionality.

Because the content from the previous platform was automatically transferred to the new one, if your contact information has not changed, there is no need for the immediate setup of an account. However, if you would like to update your preferred mode of contact and language, please allow a few extra minutes for the new account setup process.

The City has been using Blackboard Connect since fall 2009 to rapidly send emergency alerts and other important safety-related instructions via phone, email and text message. Everyone who lives or works in Diamond Bar is encouraged to register for a free Blackboard Connect account.

As a reminder, all publicly listed Diamond Bar residential and business landlines are automatically programmed into the system. Those without Internet access of who have questions regarding the City's emergency alert system should contact the Administration Department at 909.839.7013.


Hazardous And Electronic Waste Collection

Residents with unwanted electronics or household hazardous waste are reminded that the Los Angeles County's popular mobile Household Hazardous Waste and Electronic Waste Collection event is coming to Diamond Bar on Saturday, February 13.

Starting at 9:00 a.m. and until 3:00 p.m., residents are invited to drive to the 1300 block of Bridge Gate Drive in Diamond Bar and drop off any household items banned from disposal in the garbage, such as computers, television sets, microwave ovens, batteries, expired medicine and pesticides.

This is a drive-through event, which means that staff at the collection site will remove the items intended for disposal without the driver having to exit the vehicle.

Special Waste Collection Services

Of all the ways to get rid of unwanted items that cannot be thrown out with the regular garbage because of their hazardous properties, the easiest and most convenient is that which does not require you to leave your home.

Waste Management customers are encouraged to take advantage of the free At Your Door Special Collection Program when disposing of special waste in the categories of electronics, universal materials, Sharps, paint and automotive and garden products. Valley Vista Services' residential customers may also request free doorstep collection of a wide variety of refuse that falls under the hazardous waste category, including Sharps, paint and paint products, household cleaners, automotive fluids, household batteries and electronics. Residential Ev Charger Incentive Pilot Program

If you are contemplating purchasing a plug-in electric vehicle you will be pleased to learn that the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) recently launched a residential Electric Vehicle (EV) Charging Incentive Pilot Program that will help make charging at home more affordable.

Open to all individuals residing within the SCAQMD service area, this program provides an incentive to buy-down the cost of Level 2 (240 volt) residential charging stations, which typically range from \$400-\$800.

Level 2 charging is faster than Level 1 charging (using a standard 120 volt outlet). The incentive will be available on a first come, first served basis and will provide up to a \$250 rebate for the cost of hardware with an additional rebate of up to \$250 for low-income residents.

Charging stations need to be installed at a 240 volt outlet, or by a licensed electrician if there is no 240 volt outlet available, and must stay operational for a minimum of three years.

As a reminder, the City of Diamond Bar requires a permit and, in some cases, the submittal of plans for all proposed electrical vehicle charging station installations. Inspections by a City inspector will also be required.

Cold Weather Safety Tips

Record-low temperatures have prompted the Los Angeles County Health Officer to issue several cold weather alerts since the start of the 2016 winter season.

During prolonged periods of cold weather, it is important that people take extra precautions to protect themselves from frostbite, hypothermia and other serious illnesses. The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health recommends the following tips to help you, your family and neighbors stay healthy this winter:

- Dress in layers of warm clothing if you plan to be outdoors.
- Protect extremities from the cold by wearing a hat, scarf, gloves, and socks.
- Offer to help those in your neighborhood with limited access to heat, such as seniors or those who are ill. Check on them frequently.
- During peak cold times, if you don't have a heater in your home, visit indoor public facilities such as shopping malls, libraries or senior centers.
- If you have pets, bring them indoors and do not leave them outside overnight.
- If you use an outdoor generator at home, place it at least 10 feet away from all doors and windows to avoid exhaust gases entering the home.
- Stoves, barbeques and ovens can produce a deadly gas known as carbon monoxide when used to heat a home. Never use these appliances in place of approved heaters such as electric, natural gas, or fireplaces.

Carbon Monoxide Safety Reminder

Cold weather typically goes hand in hand with an increased use of fireplaces and heaters. While these and other home heating systems can greatly contribute to one's warmth and comfort, they can also pose a threat of carbon monoxide poisoning.

Because carbon monoxide is an odorless, colorless gas, it often goes undetected causing sudden illness or death. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), thousands of Americans visit the emergency room every year for treatment due to exposure to this gas, and hundreds more die from unintentional poisoning.

To help prevent carbon monoxide poisoning, be sure to install and maintain in working order battery-operated detectors outside of each sleeping area in your home, and follow these CDC-provided tips:

- If you have a fireplace, have your chimney checked and cleaned at least once a year.
 - Have your heating system, water heater and any other gas or coal-burning appliance serviced by a qualified technician every year.
 - Do not use portable, flameless chemical heaters indoors.
 - Never use a generator indoors, inside the basement or garage, or less than 20 feet from any window, door or vent.
- If any of your carbon monoxide detectors activates its alarm, immediate move outside to fresh air and call 9-1-1. Do not reenter until authorized by the emergency responders.
- Do not use portable, flameless chemical heaters indoors.
 - Never use a generator indoors, inside the basement or garage, or less than 20 feet from any window, door or vent.

If any of your carbon monoxide detectors activates its alarm, immediate move outside to fresh air and call 9-1-1. Do not reenter until authorized by the emergency responders.

Free Sandbags At Fire Stations

Properly filled and placed sandbags can be an effective means of preventing or reducing floor damage by diverting moving water away from your property.

If there are areas around your property that are prone to flooding, you may want to take advantage of free sand and bags available during cold weather months at most Los Angeles County fire stations, including 119 (20480 Pathfinder Road) and 121 (346 Armitos Road) here in Diamond Bar.

Service is self-serve, and households are each allowed up to 25 sandbags; work gloves and shovels are recommended for sandbag filling.

A few things to keep in mind:

- If sand is not available, you may use soil instead.
- Sandbags are effective only for low-flow protection (up to two feet).
- Bags should be filled only to one-half of their capacity to keep them from getting too heavy and make them easier to stack.
- Limit placement of sandbags to two layers, unless a building is used as a backing or sandbags are pyramided.
- Do not use the sandbags to build a fortress around the perimeter of your property as this can trap water between the sandbag wall and your building wall and cause damage.

Fundraising, volunteering, and entertaining opportunities available

The month of April, when Diamond Bar celebrates 27 years of cityhood, will present a great opportunity for nonprofits to raise funds for and awareness about their causes, local talent groups to perform on stage, and high school students to earn community service hours.

Fundraising: Fundraising opportunities for Diamond Bar nonprofits consist of operating a food or game booth, or supervising a carnival ride. The \$100 participation fee helps cover the cost of supplies and rentals – games and prizes for game booths, and a 10x10 canopy with two 6-foot tables and two chairs. Food booth operators each keep their individual earnings, while game and carnival ride operators receive a portion of proceeds from the sale of ride wristbands and game cards.

Entertaining: The opportunity to perform on stage is open to Diamond Bar residents of all ages with a brief pre-rehearsed solo or group act.

Volunteering: Assistance with event setup, operation and cleanup is needed between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. This volunteering opportunity is open only to high school-age Diamond Bar residents or students enrolled at Diamond Bar High School or Diamond

Ranch High School. Volunteers must wear closed-toe shoes and bring their school identification or proof of residence to show at check-in time.

Nonprofit or entertainment groups interested in being considered for the event should complete a required application and submit it to City Hall before the deadline of Monday, March 7; registration is not required for youth interested in volunteering.

Summer Youth Volunteer Leadership Program

If you are a Diamond Bar resident, between the ages of 13 and 15, interested in gaining work experience and leadership skills while also learning about the parks and recreation aspect of local government, you may want to consider applying for the City's Youth Volunteer Program.

Offered every year during the summer, the Volunteer program exposes participants to a wide variety of jobs and careers available through the recreation division of municipalities.

To be eligible to participate, you must be available to work starting May 31 and until August 12 for a minimum of 5 to a maximum of 40 hours per week. Hours are mutually arranged between the Volunteer program coordinator and the participant.

If selected, you will have the choice of assisting in one of a variety of City-sponsored summer programs such as pre-school, day camp, youth sports, senior programming, and Concerts in the Park.

The application process for the summer 2016 program opens on Monday, February 22 and closes on Thursday, April 14. Parents who wish to enroll their pre-school aged children in the spring session of the City's Tiny Tots program, can do so beginning Tuesday, March 8.

This popular enrichment program, which runs Monday, March 28 through Friday, June 17, is designed to encourage the intellectual, physical, and social growth of children ages 3 to 5 for a positive transition into kindergarten.

Participants age 3 are taught colors, shapes, numbers and the alphabet, while lesson plans for ages 4 and 5 include letter recognition, math concepts, and kindergarten readiness.

The Tiny Tots program is held weekdays from 9:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. inside the Heritage Park Community Center, with 3-year olds meeting on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and 4- and 5-year-olds meeting on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

Pomona Unified Students Become Computer Programmers

Nearly 3,000 students from schools across Pomona Unified – including Armstrong, Decker, Pantera and Ranch Hills elementary schools, Lorbeer Middle School and Diamond Ranch High School – participated in the Hour of Code, a computer science campaign that has been sweeping the globe.

Held during Computer Science Education Week, the Hour of Code infuses an extra dose of science, technology and math (STEM) instruction into hands-on practice by allowing students to experience what it is like to create computer software, apps and websites through engaging, challenging and fun computer science lessons.

"This is truly a great event to expose our students to computer science and coding and encourages them to explore the innumerable opportunities available in STEM fields," said Board of Education President Adrienne Konigar-Macklin.

With the support of Ed Tech teacher specialists, each school planned its own event, ranging from whole-school participation to a few classes or grade levels. Other schools have expanded the event beyond the designated week.

In 2014, Superintendent Richard Martinez was one of more than 100 superintendents invited to the White House to discuss education and technology and sign the Future Ready Pledge, which commits to preparing students for college and career through revolutionary digital learning.

Classes at Diamond Ranch and Pantera and Armstrong elementary schools have incorporated 1:1 iPad programs, while Diamond Point, Decker and Ranch Hills elementary schools have 2:1 Chromebook programs. Lorbeer Middle School provides electives in web and game design in an iMac lab. Decker, Armstrong and Diamond Ranch also host computer coding classes and/or robotics programs.

"Our District has diligently worked to provide more technology for students to engage in project-based learning and prepare them with skills they will need to succeed in a competitive market," Martinez said. "These programs are just the beginning for Pomona Unified and our Diamond Bar schools."

Brahma Mathletes Named National Champs

Diamond Bar High's Math Team wrapped up its undefeated season in dramatic fashion.

After eight weeks of exciting competitions with hundreds of schools across the nation, the Diamond Bar students were named the national Math Madness champions on December 11.

First reports from the December 9 finals ranked the Brahmas as 2nd place finishers against competitors from Valley Christian High School in San Jose.

Two days later, the Brahmas were named winners when officials announced that the other team had cheated.

Math Madness is a national online event inspired by college basketball's March Madness tournament. Each 30-minute weekly match contained a set of 10 questions, which became increasingly difficult as the competition progressed.

Teams play round robin format and then are seeded into a draw of 64 teams in the contest sponsored by the American Mathematics Association (AMA).

"We knew that the final match was going to be very, very close," commented math teacher and advisor Jeff Brose.

In the finals, Diamond Bar earned 62 points and Valley Christian turned in a "whopping" 93 points.

Diamond Bar's top performer, Ben Chen, who is ranked #21 in the nation out of over 17,000 students, was able to earn 9/10 on the final. Runner-ups Sabrina Tseng and William He each scored 7's on the exam.

"When Valley Christian turned in an unbelievable six perfect 10/10 perfect scores, AMA determined they had cheated," Brose said.

In the end, Diamond Bar was awarded the championship. "This capped a truly unforgettable season," Brose added.

The students learned some lifelong lessons including the value of working as a team toward a goal and performing under pressure with poise and integrity, he said. "And they learned some cool math too!"



Trip To The Getty



As part of its Adult and Family Excursions Program, the City is organizing a one-day trip to The Getty Center on Saturday, March 12.

Renowned for its architecture, gardens and extensive collection of paintings, sculptures and art pieces, the Getty Center is a favorite destination for locals and tourists.

The trip to The Getty begins around 9:00 a.m. with a comfortable ride in a motor-coach. Once at the Center, a 45-minute guided tour will be provided, followed by a picnic lunch and free time for trip-goers to explore on their own before boarding the bus at approximately 4:00 p.m.

The cost to take part in this family-friendly outing is \$42 per person, and includes roundtrip transportation, admission, lunch, and a snack and beverage for the return-home ride.
