A couple of parking stalls at the station, located at 21695 Valley Boulevard in Walnut, are now clearly marked and designated exclusively for private party to private party transactions.

Establishment of this official "safe exchange zone" is aimed at minimizing safety concerns relating to online buying and selling where the exchange of payment and product needs to take place in person.

Brahma Science Bowl Team Competes in DC

A stellar group of Diamond Bar High School (DBHS) students took 3rd place in their division during the 2016 National Science Bowl held April 27-May 1 in Washington, D.C.

Team members Miriam Sun, Jeff Chow, Leslie Sim, Ben Chen, and Brandon Hung qualified for the national finals after winning a regional competition in February.

Teams face off in a fast-paced format as they answer questions about biology, chemistry, Earth science, physics, energy and math. Over 14,000 students from across the country participate in the bowl each year.

“Our students played brilliantly, showing strong competitive spirit, and sportsmanship,” said science teacher Jose Marquez who coaches the team with math teacher Latitia Thomas.

After getting off to a slow start, the Diamond Bar students regrouped and won six consecutive rounds by impressive margins.

“I have never been more proud to be a Brahma!” said Marquez, adding that DBHS, one of the largest public schools at the competition, was just one point away from moving on to the next round.

“Our students achieved academic success while competing with class and poise. They left an indelible mark at the event.”

The National Science Bowl was created in 1991 to encourage students to excel in math and science and pursue careers in those fields.

The two seniors on the DBHS team are doing just that. Next year, Miriam Sun will study biology at Caltech, while Jeff Chow plans to focus on bioengineering at Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT).

Fairkids Field Trip Program Needs Support

The Learning Centers Division of the Fairplex is once again hard at work planning activities and preparing curriculum plans for the thousands of students who will benefit from its FairKids Field Trip Program this year.

For the last 15 years, the Fairplex has offered students and their teachers or chaperones one-day free admission into the Los Angeles County Fair to take part in organized educational and entertaining activities related to agriculture, art, science, literature, California heritage and life on a farm.

All students in preschool through 12th grade, whether home schooled or enrolled in a public or private school, are eligible to participate. Activities are grade-level and subject specific and align with California State Department of Education standards.

Parking and admission are free, however, participants must provide their own transportation. To help make the trip completely cost-free to students and their teachers, the Fairplex administers the Big Yellow Bus program which raises funds through individual donations to help schools pay for bus transportation to the fair.

Dog License Fees Increase

Diamond Bar pet owners, be advised: a new dog licensing fee schedule went into effect July 1.

Annual license fees for altered (spayed or neutered) dogs went from \$15 to \$20, and from \$35 to \$50 for unaltered dogs. The fee paid by senior dog owners is the same for unaltered dogs, but only \$10 if the pet is altered.

Revenue collected from pet licensing fees goes toward offsetting the cost of animal care and control services provided by the Inland Valley Human Society S.P.C.A (IVHS). The last time the dog licensing fee schedule was updated was in 2007.

In addition to staffing and maintaining a clean and compassionate environment for all the stray, injured and lost-and-found animals in its care, IVHS also:

- facilitates pet adoptions and reunites lost pets with their owners;
- offers low-cost veterinary care services (spaying and neutering surgery, rabies shots and other vaccines for both dogs and cats, microchipping, deworming, and nail clipping);
- responds to animal-related emergencies, including requests to pick up seriously sick or injured strays and bring them to veterinarians for emergency treatment, or collect dead strays and wildlife; and
- enforces animal control laws and investigates reports of animal abuse.

As a reminder, State law mandates that all dogs, four months of age and older, be vaccinated against rabies and maintain a current license.

It's Rattlesnake Season – Take Precautions

Here's a reminder that warm weather months are the time of year when there is an increase in rattlesnake sightings.

When it comes to avoiding conflicts with rattlesnakes while spending time outdoors on a trail, the advice from the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (DFW) is simple – give them respect and plenty of space. Rattlesnakes are not aggressive, but they will strike out if they feel threatened.

To reduce the likelihood of being bitten while hiking, remember to:

- Wear long loose-fitting pants and over-the-ankle boots
- Stick to well-used trails and avoid tall grass, weeds, and heavy underbrush where snakes may hide
- Always watch your step and look ahead several yards in front of you – you're looking for dark oval patterns that may blend in with rocks on the trail
- Watch where you put your hands; don't reach into areas obscured by brush, and look for hidden snakes before picking up sticks.

Don't assume a snake isn't poisonous if it doesn't rattle; baby rattlesnakes don't have rattles and adult rattles can break off.

If you do come across a rattlesnake, remain calm and move back slowly to give it room to retreat and put yourself out of striking range – rattlesnakes can strike only a distance equal to half their own length.

If bitten by a rattlesnake, immediate medical treatment is critical. The California Poison Control System (CPCS) recommends that you call 800.222.1222 for fast, free and expert medical advice 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Keep the wounded area still and remove watches or rings that may constrict swelling; if possible, wash the area with soap and water. Do not apply ice, use a tourniquet or try to suck out the venom. If you are with someone, have them seek emergency medical help. If you are alone, don't panic or run; instead slowly walk to your car and drive yourself to the nearest hospital.

Depending on how near your home is to open space, it's possible for snakes to make their way onto your private property. According to the DFW, the best protection against rattlesnakes entering private properties is fencing that is at least three feet high with the bottom buried a few inches in the ground. It is also useful to reduce the number of places where snakes seek shelter such as brush and piles of boards or rocks, and controlling rodent populations.



In Southern California, the most common rattlesnake is the Western Diamondback. It is identifiable by its broad, triangular-shaped head, diamond pattern on its body and rattle at the end of its tail. The California King and Gopher snakes are two common, non-venomous species that are often mistaken for rattlesnakes.

Summer Heat Safety Tips

As we move into the hottest days of summer, the City would like to remind residents that taking proper precautions will go a long way toward preventing heat-related emergencies.

These precautions consist of avoiding sun overexposure, staying cool and hydrated, and checking on elderly neighbors and others who are sensitive to the heat. Los Angeles County Health Officials recommend the following: Avoid or limit any outdoor activities during between 10:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m., when the sun's rays are the strongest. If you must be out during these hours, be sure to apply sunscreen with an SPF of at least 30, wear light-colored, loose-fitting clothing, sunglasses and a hat with a wide brim.

Do not, for any reason or brief length of time, leave children, elderly people or pets unattended in vehicles. Even with windows cracked open or rolled down, the temperature inside a car can reach very high and dangerous temperatures within minutes.

During heat peak hours, stay inside an air-conditioned area and drink plenty of water. If you do not have access to air conditioning in your home, consider staying with a relative or friend who does have a cooling system or visit an indoor shopping mall, community center or library. When heat alerts are issued, the Diamond Bar community library is among the public places designated by the County of Los Angeles as a “cooling center” to provide individuals with relief from summer heat. To locate the nearest cooling centers, call the Los Angeles County Information Line at 211 from any phone within the county or visit www.211a.org.

People who are elderly or have weak immune systems are more susceptible to suffer from heat exhaustion and heat stroke. If you have an elderly or sick neighbor who lives alone, check on them frequently to make sure they are staying cool.



Deadly Citrus Tree Disease Alert

The California Department of Food and Agriculture continues to request the public's assistance in identifying backyard citrus trees infected with Huanglongbing and the Asian citrus psyllid.

Also referred to as HLB or citrus greening disease, this bacterial infection is carried by a tiny insect called the Asian Citrus psyllid.

Diseased trees produce bitter, hard and misshapen fruit, and die within three to five years. HLB is not harmful to humans or animals.

CDFA recommends the following best practices prevent or limit the spread of this serious citrus plant disease and aphid-sized pest:

- Inspect trees for the Asian citrus psyllid and HLB monthly, and whenever watering, spraying, pruning or tending trees. If you spot the pest or disease, call 800.491.1899. Psyllids are most noticeable when new leaves are growing on the tips of the branches.
- As part of your tree care, visit your local nursery or garden center to get advice on products that can help protect your citrus tree.
- Do not move citrus plants, foliage or fruit into or out of your area, and especially across state or international borders. This could unknowingly contribute to spread of the pest and disease.
- When planting a new citrus tree, be sure to get your tree from a reputable, licensed nursery in your local area.
- When grafting citrus trees, only use registered budwood that comes with source documentation, such as the budwood offered through the Citrus Clonal Protection Program.
- Be sure to dry out citrus tree clippings or double bag them before removing the plant material from the property.

Free Gardening And Composting Workshop

If you missed last month's free Water-Wise Gardening and Organic Composting Workshop, you still have three more opportunities.

July 9, July 23 and August 13 are the dates of the remaining workshops the City is hosting this summer to teach interested homeowners how to create attractive and drought-resistant gardens, and make compost at home using organic waste and worm methods.

All three workshops will cover the same topics and will be held indoors from 1:00 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. at the Diamond Bar Center, located at 1600 Grand Avenue. Admission is free and open to all Los Angeles County residents, however, advanced registration is required as space is limited.

After each workshop, attendees will have the opportunity to purchase a backyard or worm compost bin (includes ½ lb. of worms) at the discounted prices of \$40 and \$65, respectively.

New Fiscal Year Budget

The Diamond Bar City Council adopted budget for fiscal year 2016-2017 and became effective July 1.

This year's financial plan reflects General Fund revenues in the amount of \$26.1 million and operating expenditures of \$25.8 million.

Similar to past years, the budget maintains core services, prioritizes public safety and invests in capital improvement needs that include street improvement and enhancement efforts, traffic management projects, public facility repairs and remodels, and park and trail upgrades.

It also appropriates \$1 million of the one-time development fees that the City collected, as part of the Willow Heights housing project, to create a new Technology Reserve Fund (\$200,000) and replenish four other special funds that have been depleted in recent years – General Plan Update (\$240,000), Traffic Mitigation (\$300,000), Equipment Maintenance and Replacement (\$100,000), and Public Building Maintenance (\$200,000). Funds in these accounts are used only to cover singular, emergency or unanticipated expenses, with balances carried over from year to year.

Beyond service provision and city upkeep, this year's budget also allocates funds for the purpose of furthering economic development efforts in order to diversify the City's sales tax base and expand the shopping and dining options in town.

By the close of this fiscal year, it is anticipated that the City's General Fund reserve balance will exceed \$17 million, which is nearly 67 percent of the General Fund annual operating budget.

Fiscal Year 2016-2017 starts on July 1, 2016 and ends on June 30, 2017. A copy of the complete budget document is available for viewing at City Hall and on the City website at www.diamondbarca.gov/budget.

Fy 2016-2017 City Council Goals And Objectives

An updated City Council Goals & Objectives List – a partner document of the annual municipal budget – also went into effect on July 1.

Designed to serve as a snapshot of important projects, challenges and legislative matters that will require attention in fiscal year 2016-2017 and beyond, the list identifies the following eight goals:

1. Develop and implement responsible fiscal policy that ensures long-term financial sustainability.
2. Pursue transportation infrastructure improvements that mitigate traffic congestion in Diamond Bar.
3. Implement a long-term economic development policy strategy that attracts and retains quality small businesses and national/regional credit tenants.
4. Maintain a safe, sustainable and healthy community.
5. Provide an open, efficient and responsive local government.
6. Provide and maintain high quality public facilities, infrastructure, and equipment.
7. Provide high quality community and recreation programs and services that meet the needs of the diverse Diamond Bar community.
8. Develop and maintain a professional and effective workforce to serve the public.

Sycamore Canyon Park (pictured) is located at 22930 E. Golden Springs Road. It consists of 4 acres of developed parkland and 50 undeveloped acres of open space. Its amenities include a softball field, tot lot, BBQ pits and picnic areas, a decomposed

granite walking and hiking trail, and a steep staircase leading to a plateau featuring a par course, benches, trash receptacles and interpretive panels detailing the history, topography, flora and fauna of the area.

Park Community Center on Tuesday, Thursday or Sunday evenings for casual, drop-in play. Participation is free and open to all ages and experience levels. Play time starts at 6:30 p.m. and ends at 10:00 p.m. The community center is located at 2900 S. Brea Canyon Road.

Discounted Electric Lawnmowers



If you are interested in swapping your gasoline-powered lawnmower for a cordless electric model, the South Coast Air Quality Management District has an incentive that will save you money.

This month, the SCAQMD will begin taking registrations for its 2016 Electric Lawn Mower Exchange Program, which allows residents to turn in their old, working gasoline-powered lawn mower and purchase a new cordless rechargeable

battery-electric mower at a discounted price.

Upon registration, you will be scheduled to attend one of several drive-through exchange and purchase programs taking place in the fall.
